It is wonderful to hear what our families did to mark the occasion and how children were role playing their own coronations. Pupils have been wearing their special badges that we presented them with to have as a keepsake of this special event.



Last Friday, Year 3 visited Kew Gardens as part of their Science topic about plants. Through careful observation of flowers under microscopes and a hands-on experience with different types of seeds, pupils investigated the journey and life cycle of a plant. They were very excited to hold the largest seed in the world - the coco de mer. As well as taking in all the wonderful sights that Kew has to offer, our Year 3s also had an adventure in the expansive children's garden. Despite another four day week, we have worked hard together to be the best we can be. Year 6 sat their KS2 SATs and we are very proud of their resilience and determination to show what they know in these unseen exams. Here are some of our other highlights.



We offer a phenomenal range of clubs for our pupil to participate in. On Tuesday morning, pupils in our Y1-3 basketball club came for their normal 8am start. To begin the session they did a couple of their favourite dribbling games. As Mr Butler looked around he couldn't help but reflect back to their first session in which balls were rolling this way and that. This week, Mr Butler saw how well pupils could keep a dribble alive whilst picking up a bean bag, taking that bean bag to their area, dropping it off and then chest passing to a teammate. He is very, very proud of the pupils in this club.

This week, pupils in our Nursery have been using their fine motor skills to create lovely constellations by carefully sticking down their sequin stars, one at a time. Look at the concentration in this photograph – just brilliant learning behaviours!



Pupils in RW have been learning about the life of a pirate. They decided they wanted to make their own map so they stained paper using tea and coffee. When these had dried they drew their own treasure map and even labelled the different places along the way. Doesn't this map look great – it even has a compass on it to help with directions.

In RB, pupils had a fabulous time dressing up for Pirate Day on Tuesday. During the day, pupils designed and made pirate hats, climbed the rigging on the school pirate ship and participated in a role play of finding buried treasure, as well as talking like a pirate and singing sea shanties. As part of their understanding the world and literacy topic, Sea Adventures, pupils learnt what life was like for pirates. They were particularly surprised that the crew went to sleep with the animals on the ship.



Pupils in Year 1 were so fortunate to learn with our resident artists this week. They demonstrated how well they had listened and watched the artists model the techniques when they did their own collage, painting and drawing to construct their Van Gogh-inspired sunflower pieces. Our pupils learned quickly and added their own creative flair to their artwork through the collage styles, sunflower petals and the seeds in the middle. Excellent outcomes.

Year 2 had some excellent discussions in History this week about whether the Suffragette campaign had been won easily or with difficulty, as part of our 'Making History' topic on significant activists. One pupil astutely remarked that if the ruler was Queen Victoria at the time, 'Why was she not helping women to get the right to vote, as she was a woman herself?' Pupils reflected on the 'safe' and 'dangerous' decisions that activists sometimes have to make, while looking at two significant suffragettes, Emmeline Pankhurst and Princess Sophia Duleep Singh.



Pupils in 3B have been using their research skills to explore facts about Ancient Egyptian monuments including the Great Sphinx of Giza, the Luxor Temple and important pyramids.

In 3S, pupils explored the different ways historians know what life was really like in the Stone, Bronze and Iron Ages. They had the chance to examine a range of excavated artefacts and discussed what the items could be and what they might have been used for. They enjoyed finding out that they were a variety of bowls, weapons and different types of stone tools that archaeologists had dug up from pre-historic sites.



Pupils in our 4B class have been looking at different coastal features along the UK and could identify an arch, a stack, a sand beach, a shingle beach and cliffs. They also explored how wind and waves cause erosion (cliff falls) and then transport the land particles to deposit them along the coast.

This week, 4A have also been investigating the different ways in which our coastline changes over time. Pupils learnt what the terms erosion and deposition mean before creating their own 'changing coastline' using sand and water. After, they created a quiz to test their classmate's knowledge on the

new terms. Mr Abraham was very happy with how well they remembered the meanings.

Year 5 have loved being the proud new carers of 5 healthy butterflies. Pupils now need to ensure that the butterflies are well fed and can fully strengthen their wings after emerging from their pupas. Once they have gathered their strength, the butterflies will then be released into the BWA garden.
