



COVID 19

We have had 15 pupils test positive for COVId19 this week and identified transmission in year 5 who have been put into the 'amber' category. I sent a letter out to you all explaining this during the week. We also have a member of staff who has tested positive.

As we continue our best efforts to reduce the risk of the virus spreading in our school, and local community, so that we minimise the disruption to learning for all pupils, please may I ask you to adhere to the following expectations.

- 1. Families continue to do regular lateral flow tests at home to pick up asymptomatic cases.
- 2. Close contacts should do daily lateral flow tests as set out by the NHS guidance relevant at the time.
- 3. Pupils who test positive for COVID return after two days of negative lateral flow tests as set out by the NHS guidance relevant at the time.
- 4. Wear a mask when on the school site or in the line for drop off or collection.
- 5. No-one with symptoms should come onsite.
