


This week, Year 2 recreated the Great Fire of London. Look at the amazing model they made of Pudding Lane and the surrounding streets which was safely set it alight in the playground to show how the fire started, and spread, back in 1666. It was a very exciting learning opportunity.



On Wednesday, Year 3 had their science topic brought to life with a virtual workshop led by the Horniman Museum. Pupils had the opportunity to observe a range of animal skulls and explored how different animal skeletons and teeth have evolved to adapt to different diets, lifestyles and ways of moving. Fascinating!

Year 4 had a wonderful lesson learning about the key features of an explanation text. The whole class created colour coded keys of what must be included in an explanation, before writing their own.



This week in Geography, Year 5 have been thinking about how we can reduce the use of fossil fuels in our homes and school. Pupils had to think creatively about the ways we use fossil fuels and the impact this is having on our natural resources in the UK.



6B enjoyed a virtual visit from the Metropolitan Police this week focused on personal safety. This is part of a series of talks and workshops which 6B will participate in throughout the year in their PSHCE topic where they find out how to be a good citizen.



Year 6 went on a walk this week around our local area to visit two sites that were bombed on the first night of the Blitz as part of our learning about what life would have been like during this time in World War Two. They visited a house in our local area that had a high explosive bomb dropped on it during the first night of the Blitz. The house had different brick structure to all the other houses on the street. After that

they went to see the mass bomb shelter by Clapham South Station. They discussed how it would have felt for up to 10,000 people to have to go underground in a 16ft by 168ft tunnel every night for their safety. It was truly eye opening.

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WANDSWORTH October is Black History Month at BWA

This week to celebrate Black History pupils studied the Music of Ella Fitzgerald. They analysed swing by walking on the beat with a 'skip-ty' rhythm along to the Ella Fitzgerald classic 'A Tisket A Tasket' we

discussed Ella's musical relationship with Louis Armstrong. Our pupils in KS2 composed and performed on drums Ostinatos inspired by Ghana.
