Last week RW ventured out to the Polka Theatre. During their journey they saw a range of emergency vehicles from the bus. This week, pupils have described the features of the vehicles they saw, labelled them and written about how they have changed over time, as technology has changed. A stand out moment came when they began making model vehicles and the pupils explained, in detail, which features they would include in their vehicle, based on what they had seen in real life.

In RW, our pupils have been planting sunflowers in different conditions. They will observe them grow and record the changes in their sunflower diary to find out what they need to grow well. Pupils have also been planting sunflowers in welly boots in the Reception garden to brighten it up.




Year 1 are learning all about plants and how they grow over time. Pupils planted lots of different seeds such as cow lettuce, radish and broad beans. They planted them in clear cups so that they can see the roots grow. Pupils know what plants need to grow and have taken turns to water them this week.



During their Music lesson this week, pupils in Year 2 practised their rhythm as they were singing and moving in unison first of all and as a canon afterwards. At the end of the lesson, they played a short piece called Ghost Meeting - Miss Mieville was very impressed with their musical skills.





In 3S, pupils have been showing us what brilliant mathematicians they are by improving their ability to tell the time. To do this, pupils enjoyed completing lots of practical work using their own small clocks. They have been eager to apply their new knowledge by telling Miss Stevens the time at various points throughout the day – accurately.




Following on from their exploration of the book 'Patchwork' during World Book Day, 3M were inspired to think about the experiences that have made them the young people they are today. They wrote some incredible poems or rather 'symphonies' about their hopes for the future; from the studies and careers they'd like to pursue to the friends and family they want to surround them.

This week pupils in our 3B class have been reading the No.1 Car Spotter in their English lessons. They used their research skills to find out more about countries in Africa and were able to create an information text based on these facts. Pupils also used their persuasive language skills to create an advert for a car, based on the text 'No.1 Car Spotter'.



In 4W, pupils have been investigating the different Gods and Goddesses in Viking history. They were fascinated by how Viking beliefs have influenced much of our life in the 21st Century and how many of the characters from the popular Marvel films nowadays, were based off Norse mythology.




Pupils in 4B have been thinking about their first impressions of Edward Tulane, the main character in *The Miraculous Journey of Edward Tulane*. They think he is vain, superficial, and cares more about his appearance than those who love him. Some evidence pupils found to support their opinions are below.

- '... felt himself to be an exceptional specimen.'
- '... the rabbit most preferred winter, for the sun set early and then the dining-room windows became dark and Edward could see his own reflection in the glass. And what a fine reflection it was!'

Pupils in 4A are near the end of their time exploring the same book. After spending weeks exploring the toy rabbit on his adventures with different owners, Edward has found himself restored and ready on the shop shelf for another owner to love. It is now 4A's job to convince others to buy him!

Year 5's highlight of the week is also English. Pupils have started to write their very own Greek mythology-based narrative chapters, in which Odysseus must defeat an almighty creature of some sort. They have been so creative in designing and describing their own creatures and foes, to create suspense.



Our Year 6 pupils have really enjoyed finding out about the history of Green Lake. They are intrigued to find out more about Sam and his onions as well as Kissin' Kate Barlow before she became an outlaw. They highly recommend this book.

6B have also been reading and enjoying *Holes*, by Louis Sachar. This week they wrote a diary entry, written from the main character's perspective on his first day at the infamous Camp Green Lake. They all enjoyed getting into the character of one of the inmates and have produced some amazing writing.
