Something very exciting happened in Nursery this week. Pupils opened up a new self-selection Literacy and Maths shed in their outdoor area. These special sheds are packed full of resources that pupils can select at any time to help them learn when they are outside. Here is a picture of some pupils having fun practising to write our names by the Literacy shed.

Pupils in RW have been learning more about Space this week. They have mixed shaving foam and paint to create a surface for their own planets and created their own space craft using junk modelling resources. It was great to see the detail pupils were thinking about when building their space craft and how they could describe how it worked.



This week, Year 1 were very fortunate to participate in a workshop at Fulham Palace. They saw toys which were made 120 years ago, considered what materials they were made from and even saw (but didn't touch) an old horse made from lead. Pupils also looked at toys played with by children who lived at Fulham Palace in the 20th century and considered the limited materials people had access to during the war to make toys with. Miss To was incredibly impressed with how focused and engaged they were in the session, extending their learning in both Science and History.

Pupils in 1B have been working very hard on writing a story similar to The Tiger Who Came To Tea, thinking of their own animals that knocked on the door instead. They wrote great sentences about colourful unicorns and furry koalas and even scaly chameleons.



In Science, pupils in Year 2 continued their learning about properties of materials and explored the Key Question: Which materials will sink and which will float? Presented with a range of items made from different materials, pupils made predictions before carrying out the experiment to check the accuracy of their predictions by plunging items in water. They discussed density and how heavy items may not always sink nor light objects float.

Pupils in 4B have been learning about how different religions decided what actions are right and wrong. This week, they learnt about how humanists make moral decisions and how Christians can use the story of Adam and Eve to learn about temptation and decision making.




In Year 4, pupils have been studying the Anglo-Saxon tale of Beowulf. Pupils looked at an excerpt from the original poem and investigated what they could find out about Anglo-Saxon life under the Kings of the time before watching how the monster was defeated by the Danish prince.

5LT's highlight has been in history this week. Pupils have been learning about Ancient Greek story-telling and drama, exploring the invention of comedy and tragedy. They have been set a task to re-enact a famous Ancient Greek myth of their choice. It has been brilliant watching them rehearse at playtime and we are all very excited for their performances

next week.



This week 5M created the solar system out of fruit. They first explored how scientific ideas about our universe have developed over time, progressing from a geocentric to a heliocentric model where the planets revolve around the sun. Pupils had to work out which planets were closest to the sun and then represented each planet with a fruit depending on its size - the Earth was a cherry tomato!



Pupils in 5B have enjoyed writing biographical paragraphs about well-known public figures, such as the Bronte Sisters, Serena Williams, David Beckham and Mozart. They used information gathered from their non-fiction text, 'You Are Awesome,' and included grammatical features such as relative clauses and subordination clauses in order to vary sentence structure.

Our Year 6 pupils have been learning about the role of the Commonwealth during World War II this week in their history lesson. They looked at historical sources, which included people from the Commonwealth's reasons for supporting the British Army. Furthermore, they discussed whether people from the Commonwealth were treated fairly during the war, reading through accounts of soldiers and the discrimination that some faced. Year 6 showed maturity during their discussions.



Information on Measles / MMR vaccination – message from the NHS

Measles cases are rising across the country, with over 102,000 children starting primary school in England being at risk of catching the disease. We are asking education settings to share key messages from the NHS about MMR / measles and how to get vaccinated.

Measles is highly infectious and if left unvaccinated nine out of ten children in a classroom can catch the disease if just one child is infectious.
