We have had leaders come from other schools and they have been very impressed with the excellent learning behaviours they saw as well as our engaging learning environment.



#### Attendance

We are so very fortunate to have a wide range of specialist teachers at BWA. Walking around our school it is always such a joy to see the magnificent artwork pupils have created. Our Resident Artists were teaching pupils in 2B this week.

Pupils learnt about folk art through exploring the art of the Gond tribe from India. They learned that Gond art is known for its bright colours and intricate patterns. Pupils in 2B practiced mixing their own secondary colours and then created some spectacular artwork of peacocks using acrylic paint and oil pastels.

Nursery have started learning phonics and have gone fishing this week. The catch of the day are the two new sounds we have learned: s and a. Not only are we practising hearing these sounds at the start of words, we have even started writing them. Fishing rods and pencils at the ready, here we go...!





This week, pupils in RW have continued to learn more about dinosaurs. Pupils used junk modelling to build their very own dinosaurs that they will paint next week. Pupils also created their own dinosaur skeletons, which you can see in this photograph, by drizzling PVA glue onto black card before setting out cotton buds to show the different bones that make up a skeleton.

Pupils have also been learning about World Religion Day, which is on Sunday 21st January. They have had some lovely discussions about what the children know and what experiences they have of different religions. They also discussed how tolerance is part of our British values and how we respect each other's different beliefs across the world.

RB have been reading The Gingerbread Man and wondered if they could save him at the end of the story. They tested if he

could swim by putting him into water and observing the changes. The pupils made impressive predictions such as; 'he will sink', 'the colour will change' and 'he will get soggy and go to pieces'. At the end of the day, they realised their predictions were correct. The pupils were excited to be 'scientists' and conduct this experiment, and thought of new ways they could save the Gingerbread Man. Afterwards they made boats and bridges to help him escape in other ways, so they have been engineers as well.






Year 1 have been making links between their Science and

English this week when reading Dinosaurs and All That Rubbish. The story explores how rubbish and pollution can damage our planet and the importance of taking care of it. The pupils have been up-levelling their vocabulary through retelling the story, supported by a word bank to start to use the new words in context, like smoulder and paradise!

This week, Year 2 pupils explored the lovely picture book, 'The Invisible' by Tom Percival which raised lots of different

topics such as poverty and community. They talked about not taking anything for granted and wrote fabulous diary entries as Isabel, the main character, imagining how she felt both at the start and at the end of the story. Pupils used expanded noun phrases, commas in a list and even rhetorical questions, truly showing empathy in their writing.






Pupils in Year 3, pupils explored the different layers of the Earth. They used chrome books to research the different types of rock that make up the layers and their temperatures. Pupils were very surprised at how hot the Core of the Earth is.

Pupils in 3B have been busy exploring the main types of rocks this week and ways to identify them. They learnt that igneous rocks are formed from the cooling and solidification of molten (melted) rock. Sedimentary rocks are formed from deposits of sediment compacted over time and that Metamorphic rocks are rocks that have been substantially changed over time, usually because of high heat or high pressure.



TYPES OF BOCKS



Pupils in Year 4 have continued to investigate how electricity works. After building some simple circuits and using their knowledge to fix broken circuits they looked at how switches effect the flow of electric. Pupils experimented with switches before challenging themselves to see how many switches they could include in a working circuit.

In 5LT, pupils have been reading Nicola Davies' short story, 'The Day War Came' about a refugee child looking for a place in a new school. The class were set a challenge of persuading the story's reluctant teacher to be more considerate and empathetic by allowing the child to join her class. We have been blown away by the power of 5LT's persuasive writing and particularly their maturity when discussing such topics.

In 5S, pupils have started reading the book, 'Oranges in No Man's Land' by Elizabeth Laird. This story is inspiring our descriptive narrative writing which they have been planning this week. In science, pupils have been exploring the question: what are thermal conductors and are they important? They made predictions and carried out an investigation to see which materials are the best thermal conductors.



Year 6 participated in a practical science lesson this week by dissecting lamb hearts, as part of their new topic: 'How does the circulatory system work?' In pairs, they identified the aorta and pulmonary veins and arteries, before opening the heart to discover atriums and ventricles. Year 6 were very brave in their investigation.

Pupils in 6B have written biographies about Environmental Activist Greta Thunberg this week. At the start of the week, they identified the key features of a biography so they could incorporate them in their own pieces and learned about the passive voice as a way to make their writing more formal and varied. 6B researched key information about Greta to have a better understanding of her early life and key milestones to share. Pupils enjoyed writing their biographies as a chance to show the significance of Greta's climate actions and bring awareness to the cause.



#### Information on Measles / MMR vaccination - message from the NHS

Measles cases are rising across the country, with over 102,000 children starting primary school in England being at risk of catching the disease. We are asking education settings to share key messages from the NHS about MMR / measles and how to get vaccinated.

Measles is highly infectious and if left unvaccinated nine out of ten children in a classroom can catch the disease if just one child is infectious.
