Here are some of our highlights from the first week of Spring2.



A new term, a new topic and one that might just end up being their favourite: Food! Each week, pupils in our Nursery will be exploring the topic through a different story, talking about, making and, importantly, eating the food they make. Pupils took to the stage to act out their first story: Little Red Riding Hood. Our actors did a wonderful job and earned themselves a standing ovation. Pupils decided that homemade jam tarts would make a lovely treat for Grandma and their first thing to make together as a class. Yum!

In RB, as part of their learning about journeys, pupils have been finding out more about the amazing buildings in their city and have been looking carefully at the shapes and features of them, as they make their own drawings. Pupils have been

using rulers to add details and have talked animatedly about the ones they have seen before. One of the pupils even requested pictures of his favourite building, the Burj Khalifa, so he could follow his own line of enquiry. They wondered what your favourite building? Is it old or new?

Pupils in RW have dived straight in to their Traditional Tales topic, starting with the story of The Gingerbread Man. They have enjoyed playing in the new Gingerbread Cafe and decorating their own Gingerbread people. Pupils have also enjoyed a science experiment where they investigated how the Gingerbread Man could survive in different liquids.





This week, pupils in Year 1 began their new science topic about plants. They showed impressive knowledge of the plants they already know and built on this by learning the names and functions of different parts of a plant. To embed this knowledge further, the pupils became 'green-fingered' by observing and feeling some plants up close. They will

now look after these plants throughout the term, considering what the plants need to grow healthily.

In Maths this week, Year 2 launched their Money topic

by looking at the value of different bank notes and coins. They then thought about strategies to count money using pounds and pence, explored how to compare amounts and successfully added amounts of money together.

Pupils 3B have been been learning about Ancient Egypt and were excited to be archaeologists, examining objects found in King Tutankhamen's tomb to





Pupils in 2B have been learning all about money in


Maths. They have enjoyed finding total amounts of money using coins and notes and working together to solve problems about money. This is such a great life skill and can be tricky to start.

Based on what they learnt in Year 2, pupils in Year 3 have been exploring different ways to represent specified amounts of money in coins and notes.

This week, pupils in year 4 started their new Humanities topic investigating some parchment that had been discovered by a local museum. As they read the extracts, studying the vocabulary carefully, they realised the dreaded invaders and raiders were the Vikings. Pupils in Year 5 were given a variety of spices and items that relate to their new history topic and had to predict which civilisation they would be studying this half term. There were lots of different guesses and great discussion when they were introduced to their new Early Islamic Civilisation topic.




Pupils in Year 6 have begun their half term by starting their new class text: 'Holes' by Louis Sachar. They have been entertained by the nicknames of Stanley's (the protagonist) campmates and have made inferences of the characters, justifying their ideas with evidence from the text. Year 6 are looking forward to continuing the text and meeting The Warden, who the class predict will be selfish and antagonistic.

6B are diving straight into Spring 2 with a new unit of maths. Pupils are using their knowledge and understanding of fractions, decimals, multiplication and division in order to calculate percentage. 6B have considered how this is a skill that can be easily applied to our daily lives in real context such as shopping and cooking – another essential life skill.


Attendance

Attending school every day is very important. Pupils should be in school every day. If a pupils has attendance of 90% and below they are a Persistent Absentee.

Our attendance is affected by families taking extended holidays out of term time. Holidays should not be taken in term time. Medical appointments should also be made out of school hours.

We know that pupils get sick and will need to rest to recuperate. Please do use this <u>NHS guidance</u> to help you make decisions when your child is ill about whether they should attend school or stay at home.





Information on Measles / MMR vaccination - message from the NHS

Measles cases are rising across the country, with over 102,000 children starting primary school in England being at risk of catching the disease. We are asking education settings to share key messages from the NHS about MMR / measles and how to get vaccinated.

The <u>Back to school MMR Guidance</u> from the NHS includes information to share, as well as example social media posts which can be found here: <u>NHS Vaccine Poster</u> and <u>NHS MMR Poster</u>.

Measles is highly infectious and if left unvaccinated nine out of ten children in a classroom can catch the disease if just one child is infectious.

Birthday Treats



When it is a child's birthday during the school term, parents and carers can choose to celebrate this special occasion by bringing in food to share with the class if they wish. This food is given out at the end of the school day so that parents and carers can decide if their child consumes it. If you do choose to bring in food for the class, we would really appreciate it if, in addition to nut-free, consideration could be given to other allergies, religious and dietary preferences, so that all children can share in the class celebration.
